WICHITA HIGHS ANNEX 4TH ANNUAL STATE MEET

Manhattan, Kan., May 9.—Wichita captured the fourth annual state high school track and field meet held here this afternoon under the auspices of the Kansas State Agricultural college with a total of 24 ½ points. Marion came second with 24 points and Chase county high third with 13 ½ tallies. Dutton won fourth place for Concordia and second all around honors. Treweeke, of the Wichita team, cleaned up the field for individual honors with record breakers in the high and broad jumps and points in the hurdles and discus events. Treweeke raised his own record in the high jump of 5 feet 8 ½ inches to 5 feet 9 ½ inches, and beat the old record in the broad leap four inches by clearing 21 feet 6 inches of saw dust. The relay and high hurdles records were the only track records to fall. Brown, of Alma, lowered the high hurdles record to 16 3-5 in order that he might defeat Treweeke of Wichita in this event. Marion's relay team clipped one second off the relay record held by Hutchinson, relaying the four laps in 3:43 1-5. Dutton won the 100 and furlong races in easy fashion, not being forced to extend himself in either.

WIND MAKES SLOW TIMES

Jeter, of Wichita, sprang a surprise when he sped ahead of the field in the 50-yard race and broke the tape a winner in 5 3-5 seconds. Kendall, of Tonganoxie, loped away from the field in the mile event winning in handy fashion in 4:52. A high wind raged across the north side of the field throughout the whole time of the meet and was a severe detriment to the runners in the distance events and slowed the time considerably.

Casey, of Norton, led in the 220 low hurdle race till he endeavored to top the last hurdle. Here he met his Waterloo, falling flat on the track but showing pluck and aggressiveness enough to pull up and win third place. Brown, of Alma, won this event in 28 flat. Murphy, of Tonganoxie, pulled first in the half mile run in 2:07.

Freebourne held a lead of 25 yards in the relay over Crawford, of Topeka, who had been vaulting all afternoon. On the last lap of the relay, by the nerviest brand of running, he cut Freebourne's lead down to five yards at the lap.

Crawford, of Topeka high school, won out in the pole vault after 2 hours of competition. The height, 10 feet 8 inches, was remarkably good for high school vaulters, considering the barrier the wind offered. Treweeke's work in the jumps was also of the highest order and establishes records that will stand for a good many days to come. Sharpe, of Carbondale, won the shot put, easily breaking Butler's record by four feet. Schultze captured first in the discus when he sailed the platter 111 feet 3 inches and broke Hall's old record, an even twelve inches. Hewey, of Wichita, won the javelin throw at 148 feet, thereby establishing a state record in the event which was on its first legs in today's meet.

1 mile relay—Won by Marion; Topeka, second; Chase county, third; Abilene, fourth. Time, 3:43 1-5. (New state record.)

Pole vault—Won by Crawford, Topeka; Garver, Abilene, second; McCreedy, Wichita and Vernson, Blue Rapids, tied for third and fourth. Height, 10 feet 8 inches.

12-pound shot put—Won by Sharpe, Carbondale; Freebourne, Marion, second; Casey, Norton, third; Dutton, Concordia, fourth. Distance, 46 feet. (New state record.)

High jump—Won by Treweeke, Wichita; Woolwine, Marion, second; Harris, Marion, third; Boccock, Chase county and Benson, Wakeeney, tied for fourth. Height 5 feet 9 ½ inches. (New state record.)

Discus—Won by Schultze, Wakeeney; Betzen, Normal school, second; Sharpe, Carbondale, third; Treweeke, Wichita, fourth. Distance, 111 feet 3 inches. (New state record.)

Broad jump—Won by Treweeke, Wichita; Ayers, Almeno, second; Freebourne, Marion, third; Schroeder, Fredonia, fourth. Distance, 21 feet 6 inches. (New state record.)

Javelin—Won by Hewey, Wichita; Betzen, Normal, second; Freebourne, Marion, third; Underwood, Chase county, fourth. Distance, 148 feet.
